Staff News



Our Attendance Challenge of 96% was successful again!

Well done to 124 children who received the Gold Attendance Certificates for 100% attendance during the Spring Term. This was another great achievement for the majority of children especially considering there have been many illness bugs around this term.

Whole school attendance sits above our target at 96.7% which again is a brilliant achievement.



Moving into the academy our monitoring of attendance will remain vigilant and our focus is to reduce the number of children being unnecessarily late for registration and missing the first part of the morning session will remain unchanged.

Springing into a Summer of sport

As we look forward to a busy summer of sport, we can reflect back on what has been a challenging spring period for Warboys. Both our Year 5 and 6 football teams have been very busy representing the school in cup competitions and by the time this newsletter comes out, we will have entered a new inter academy competition involving our boys and girls from Years 3/4 and 5/6. For the first time ever, we have entered an elite team into the HSSP Hockey and Netball tournament where we have faced the best our local schools have to offer. Closer to

home we have continued to push swimming across Year 5 and are on target to achieve 75% of children in the year being able to swim at least 25 meters by the time they leave school. Thank you for all your continued support.

Warwick Castle

Children in Key Stage 1 visited the spectacular Warwick Castle to complete their Spring Term topic on castles. Crossing the drawbridge over the moat, they were amazed by the shear size of the castle. Their fascination continued as they explored the battle room where they saw weapons, horses and knights in shining armour. Children were very knowledgeable and showed off key vocabulary when identifying parts of the castle. Many children were surprised to see peacocks roaming freely around the grounds of the castle. It was an excellent way to consolidate heir learning.

Early Years children have enjoyed some four legged visitors as part of their topic on 'Animals'. A tortoise who was a talented escapologist, made a lively entrance to the

Children ended their topic on animals with a visit to Hamerton Zoo. They had a terrific day and for once the weather was kind to them. Residential Visit to Grafham

In March every child in Year 4 Year took part in the annual residential visit to Grafham Water. Our first challenge was to make our own beds - that was indeed a difficult challenge for some. Sadly, the stormy weather prevented any activities on the water which was a real shame. With waves on the water we reshuffled activities on land. We all had the opportunity to have a go at the high ropes. This was really scary for some, especially because the wind was so strong. Thankfully we all





wore a safety harness.

The low ropes looked easy and would have been if we could just climb, but we had to work as a team to complete tasks on the ropes. It was far more difficult than we had thought. We soon learnt that we needed to communicate clearly to get the best from the teams to make the tasks easier.

The favourite activity was the Grafham challenge. We were blindfolded before we followed a course through the woods marked with a rope. Again we had to work well as a team. Shuffling at the pace of the slowest person we had to give instructions and warning to the person behind if the path went up, down or even over objects. Not seeing where we were going made this challenge difficult . Some worried because they didn't like the fact they couldn't see where they

were putting their hands or what they were climbing through. It was great fun though and we all got so muddy. We were proud because we supported each other and attempted every activity.

All in all, they had to remember and perform twenty different movements. They were all very supportive of each other and showed not only a high level of skill but also great sportsmanship. Shanghai Teacher come to Warboys

In January, we played host to two Shanghai Maths teachers, Miss Mao and Miss Pei, as part of the DfE maths exchange programme between England and China. Over the two week period, the school showcased several maths events to over 300 primary teachers from all over the county. Children in Year 5 and in Year 2 worked hard with the Chinese teachers developing Mastery Maths Skills.

Representatives from the DfE and from the County Maths Hub also attended the showcase lessons. They were very impressed with how engaged the pupils were and commented on the impeccable learning behaviours shown throughout. Although this was a major event requiring an enormous of organisation and some upheaval for classes



and staff, it was an incredible opportunity

for Warboys School to demonstrate its strengths to others.

It has been great to see how Mastery Maths has helped develop our children's confidence when approaching independent maths.
